

1 Policies and requirements





NWO Open Science policies

Aimed at ensuring that publicly funded research outputs are as open as possible, and only closed where necessary, for the benefit of science and society.

NWO grant requirements

Open Access publishing

 All publications emerging from NWO funded research must be made available open access immediately upon publication.

Research Data Management

- Researchers are expected to carefully manage all research data generated as part of NWO funded projects.
- As open and FAIR as possible, closed if necessary.
- As a minimum, research data underlying research publications should be published alongside those publications, unless there are valid reasons not to do so.





Open access books

- NWO also expects books, book chapters and edited volumes resulting from research funded by NWO to be made available open access.
- NWO supports open access books with a dedicated funding scheme.
- Up to € 10.000,- per academic book (monograph or collected volume) provided it is the result of NWO funded research*.

Open Science Fund



- New funding instrument to recognise and reward researchers who are at the forefront of open science
- Open to researchers from all disciplines
- For projects up to max €50.000,-
- 2021 first round: huge interest from the community (167 eligible proposals of which 26 were awarded)
- Open science track record question
- Published accepted and rejected proposals (with consent)

JupyterFAIR: Integration of interactive research environments to data repositories to facilitate FAIR data management practices


















Open Science Fund 2023

- Aim to support projects specifically designed to implement and stimulate open-science practices.
- Projects up to €50,000 and one year duration. Total available budget: €3,000,00.
- Two deadlines in 2023 (€1,500,00 each): 9 May and 26 September.
- NEW: Applicants will review each other's proposals (NWO Open Competition XS method).
- NEW: Open science methodology (including RDM and software sustainability) part of evaluation.
